Passage: Isaiah 41:1-10

Sermon: He Is With You To Help You

Sermon Series: Fear Not: Gospel Truths for Anxious Times

Introduction: The Book of Isaiah was written about 150 years before the Lord sent His people into exile under Babylon. The purpose of Isaiah was to provide Israel with a warning of their impending judgment but also comfort them during their time of trouble. In this passage God speaks of a global crisis that overwhelmed even the Babylonians. We too live at a time that is globally (and perhaps personally) overwhelming. Here, God reveals that we have nothing to fear if we place our trust in Him, the author of history.



Into the Word

This is an invitation to the nations to enjoy the blessings of the God of Israel.

What can the invitation to God's enemies in verse 1 teach us about God's plans? Consider: Isaiah 1:18; 1 Timothy 2:1-7

How might verses 2-4 affect the way we interpret historical events? Note: There is a paradox between man's responsibility and God's absolute sovereignty.

How do verses 8-10 describe God's relationship with His people? Does this matter? Consider: Deuteronomy 7:7-9; Ephesians 1:1-10



Into the Heart

Only God can protect us against the uncertainty of our circumstances.

Functionally, where do we often look for security in the midst of uncertainty? Note: Verse 5-7 speaks to the silliness of idolatry.

How might the truth of our election comfort us in the midst of our struggles? Note: Verse 9 is best translated, "...I have determined to never cast you off."



Into the World

Though the world seems out of control God is with us.

What aspects of life do you think people are finding the most overwhelming?

How can we share God's gracious invitation to our neighbors in the midst of this overwhelming time?
