


## **Growth Group Discussion Guide**

Passage: Mark 12:35-37

**Introduction**: In this passage the series of conflicts between Jesus and the religious leaders come to end as Jesus questions them. Quoting Psalm 110, Jesus asks the scribes to explain why King David would refer to the Messiah as his superior, if in fact the Messiah is David's own son. And while this paradox dazzled the crowd, this passage reveals not only Jesus' true identity but also the nature of the Bible.



What aspect of this passage do you find the most confusing or surprising?

How would you explain the mystery of Psalm 110 in your own words? (v. 36) Note: Since David is the highest human authority, the second "Lord" of Psalm 110:1 must refer to a divine figure then any merely human king.

What does the mystery of Psalm 110 teach us about Jesus' nature?


Consider: Luke 1:26-35

Note: We believe that Jesus is both fully God (Son of God) and fully man (Son of David)

What can Jesus' comments in verse 36 teach us about the Bible?

Consider: 2 Peter 1:21, Luke 24:27


Note: The source of Scripture is God, the subject of Scripture is Jesus.
